
THE ARCHBISHOP JANANI LUWUM TRUST UK (AJLT) FINANCIAL REPORT 2018/19

The Archbishop Janani Luwum Trust (AJLT) has continued to deliver on its three core objectives as detailed in its Trust document.


During the financial year 2018/19 total income was £5,426 whilst total expenditure was £6,802.88.

The distribution of expenditure in terms of its core objectives can be seen in the graph below.



The Trust has minimal operational outlay - with its UK costs principally being website related expenditure and bank fees.

The amount of resources AJLT has dedicated towards its core objectives in recent years is summarised in the graph below (figures are in pound sterling).



Christian Ministry:

As a Christian organisation, sharing the love and teaching of Jesus Christ remains a fundamental goal of the Trust. During 2018/19, AJLT supported the work of the Archbishop Janani Luwum Theological college which draws its students from the various dioceses in Northern Uganda, Southern Sudan and the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

18 students completed their studies in 2018/19. There were a further 44 students undergoing training. The college currently offers Diploma and Certificate courses in Theology, Counselling, Chaplaincy and Child Development.

The Theological college continues to be in significant need of financial assistance and we welcome the opportunity to partner with any group or individuals who are able to support us in this cause.

AJLT would like thank all who have supported its work in this area in 2018/19.

The Trust has also led the annual commemoration service, held in February each year at St. John's Stratford to celebrate the life and legacy of St. Janani Luwum.

The theme for the 2019 celebrations was the Legacy of Janani Luwum in the Power of Prayer.

We would like to thank the PCC of St. John's Stratford, the Acholi London Christian Fellowship and other groups for ensuring this annual commemoration event continues to thrive.


Education:

Whilst the two decade old war may have ended in Northern Uganda, the population which lost almost everything continue to live in abject poverty. There has been no structural program for the rehabilitation and integration of those who bore physical and psychological scars from war. Rather, the enormous task has been left to non-governmental organisations (NGO), community groups and the church.

Students in Northern Uganda continue to suffer from reduced chances in life due to the lack of resources to fund their education. Many who start the process of education are unable to complete their studies due to resource constraints.

AJLT educational spend over the last few years has been in the area of scholarships for pastors' children, orphans and disadvantaged children.


Young people are the generation that would lead to the rebuilding of their communities and we welcome the opportunity to partner with individuals and groups that are able to support us in this cause.

Poverty Alleviation:

When a community lack clean drinking water, healthcare becomes a challenge. AJLT has supported the rehabilitation of wells and partnered with the communities in Bobi and Pakwelo through various developmental projects. The Trust has also supported the work of the Women's Development Centre at the Diocese of Northern Uganda.
